As we look forward to 2018, I would like to take this opportunity to introduce the addition of two new Deputy Headteachers, Michelle Reysenn and Simon Raisey. Michelle will be leading on Curriculum, Standards and Progress. Simon will lead Behaviour, Personal Development and Welfare across the school. We welcome them to Notton House and they look forward to meeting you in the new term.

This year has seen some significant improvements to the school and living accommodation. We are due to finish the refurbishment of Avon and Clifton areas by the end of January 2018. This will bring the addition of 3 new ensuite bedrooms and a new shared bathroom in both areas. Thank you to Bristol City Council for their support with this important work.

We have a new options timetable with more KS3 students accessing vocational courses at our partner schools. Some of our KS4 and KS5 students continue to study at different colleges, notably at Wiltshire College, Lackham where we have 5 students studying Animal Care or Lands Based Studies. These students regularly receive glowing reports



from their tutors on these courses. Moving into 2018 we at Notton House hope to develop our educational links to the countryside further. We are in discussion with Jamie's Farm, in Box to plan some joint work in order to begin to build into our curriculum a "farm to fork" initiative. This is in the ideas phase at present, but we shall keep you posted as this develops.

We are working hard with our design team to create our new school logo and website, which we know will allow parents and carers to access school information more easily. It will also display the fantastic work our staff and students do to our wider community.



We have enjoyed seeing many more parents and carers at our coffee mornings and end of term global themed celebration assemblies. All of our parents and carers are warmly welcomed to into Notton House to celebrate the achievements of our young people. Our students have made some fantastic artwork this term that proudly decorated our newly decorated dining room and corridors.

We pledge to keep working hard to build strong links with our parents and carers to provide the right support and challenge so that our students receive the best education and opportunities in life.

The Philippines was the first country in Southeast Asia to gain independence after World War II, in 1945.



WHAT IS PIXL EDGE?

Term 1 & 2 has seen the start of the PiXL Edge timetable for a number of boys across Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4. The purpose of this



programme is being to develop key skills in leadership, organisation, resilience, initiative and communication, all being achieved in a programme and environment out of school.



The boys have spent the majority of term 1 and 2 at The Wild Place Project where they have undertaken a number of different activities including; low ropes course and climbing, archery, zorb football, rope walking, axe throwing and orienteering challenges. The focus on these tasks largely cen tred on leadership and communication and solving problems in a group.

They have also had the opportunity to build on skills they first learned on the John Muir award by pursuing bush-craft activities in the form of shelter building, safe fire lighting, whittling and conservation.

The boys have taken well to this relatively new opportunity and term 3 gives an opportunity to develop these skills further by engaging further with the community (museum trips and interactive learning opportunities) and continuing the progress they are making.

Employers look for young people who are rigorous, rounded and grounded, with not only skills and knowledge, but also the wider behaviours and attitudes that are needed for success in life and work. Programmes such as The Edge that support and encourage this wider development in young people as a part of their school journey are a welcome step towards ensuring that all young people can fulfill their potential."
